## From the Mayor's Desk City Progress Report A Look Back, A Look Ahead

Long-time residents may recall a different community: acres of undeveloped land, unpaved streets, the old Simmons Factory on East Jones Bridge Road and the thick stand of trees where The Forum is now located.

But change is inevitable, it is how we manage the change that's important.

It is the responsibility of your city leaders to envision, guide and manage the inevitable changes to our community. It's been six years since Peachtree Corners incorporated. Let's look at the numbers, at our key projects – and at our future.

These are impressive increases, and there is more good news:

- 6.35% increase in the number of Housing Units, 16,055 (2012) vs. 17,062 (2017)
- 4.8% increase in our Median Home Prices: \$278,600 (2012) vs. 291,900 (2017)
- 216% increase in Building Permit Revenues: \$193,054 (2013) vs. \$610,939 (2017)
- 22% decrease in Office Vacancies: 25.1% (2014) vs. 19.6% (2017)

And since 2012, the city has invested:

- \$1,786,596 to build 4.5 miles of sidewalks
- \$6,412,000 to build or resurface 14.5 miles of roads (not including the Town Center)

Additionally, our city is home to 49 technology companies, 18 biotech businesses and 84 international companies.

### Key Projects:

Town Center – without vision – the 21-acre site in the heart of our community would have been developed into 267 garden-style apartments. Instead, residents and visitors will enjoy a community gathering spot with a town green that will feature a performance stage, large outdoor screen, children's play area, a veteran's monument, a Cinebistro dinner theater, restaurants, including Firebirds and Marlowe's Tavern and 74 high-end townhomes, some that feature rooftop decks.

The city has also recently purchased a 5.762 tract of land adjacent to the Town Center which could be used to add a performing arts facility, expanded town green, events space, gallery space and offices.

As the city strives to become a more walkable community, we will also incorporate a safe means to cross over Peachtree Parkway. The traffic count on this busy state road is over 40,000 vehicles per day and that number is expected to increase to 50,000 within the next five years. The city has budgeted funds to build a pedestrian bridge that will line up with the path of the multi-use trail at the Town Center.

The city's Town Center plans also inspired others. Currently plans for the property next to the Town Center include a boutique hotel and a trendy urban-style midrise.

## Cast Your Ballot This Fall for Sunday Sales Referendum

On November 6, 2018, a special municipal election will be held at City Hall for qualified voters to decide whether to allow the City to permit and regulate Sunday sales of distilled spirits or alcoholic beverages by the drink from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Early voting takes place at City Hall from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. Oct. 15 - Nov. 2. No voting will be permitted on Monday, Nov. 5.



All municipal elections take place at Peachtree Corners City Hall, 310 Technology Parkway, Peachtree Corners, Georgia, 30092 regardless of polling places for county, state or federal elections. The interior offers cozy fireplaces and rustic mountain-themed decor. A variety of starters, small plates, salads, burgers, pizza, chicken, steak and fish, desserts, non-alcoholic beverages and an array of beers, wines and cocktails are available. The dog menu includes a complimentary bowl of water along with three food items for purchase.

## Councilmember Sadd Selected for 2019 Leadership Gwinnett Class



Councilmember Phil Sadd (Post 1) is among 40 local leaders chosen for the 2019 Leadership Gwinnett Class. He began the nine-month program in August.

Established in 1985, Leadership Gwinnett was created to ensure that the community's most influential leaders are knowledgeable about issues pertaining to the county and region. The class will take an in-depth look at the many sectors of Gwinnett – infrastructure, economics, education, health and human services, justice and regional relations.

The program includes an opening retreat, seven learning days, monthly study groups, tours and hands-on experiences within the county along with a closing retreat. The class will study topics such as leadership in a world class community, infrastructure, economics, education, health & human services, and will participate in study groups, exclusive tours and hands-on experiences.

“Selection of these top candidates requires balance of occupation, qualifications and a representation that reflects a cross section of the county,” said Executive Director of Leadership Gwinnett, Lisa Zaken. “Over the coming year, this diverse group will gain a true understanding of the people and issues shaping our community's future – and more importantly, how they can impact those issues.”

Leadership Gwinnett has graduated nearly 1,200 alumni since it was founded.

## Calling All U.S. Veterans

The Peachtree Corners Veterans Monument Association has made arrangements with Tytan Creates, an award-winning content creation company, to record short video introductions of the veterans of Peachtree Corners.

The recordings will be incorporated into the Monument's Interactive component. Each recording session will last no more than 15 minutes, with the final product to be a one- to five- minute edited recording. 
## Work on City's Multi-Use Trails Continues

By the end of the year, barring any weather delays, residents and those who work nearby will be able to enjoy a leisurely stroll around a portion of Technology Park Lake. The 15-acre lake is located behind the office buildings fronting Technology Parkway and Technology Parkway South. Work is expected to begin this fall and should be complete by the end of the year.

Measuring just over 1/3 of a mile, the new portion of the trail will connect to the existing multi-use trail along Technology Parkway and Technology Parkway South creating a loop. The new section of the trail consists of a 12-foot concrete greenway, a precast concrete boardwalk and three pedestrian plazas. The plazas will feature seating and offer pleasant resting spots along the trail. The plans also feature an overlook platform to view Technology Park Lake.

The work is part of the first phase of the city's plans for a multi-use trail system that will crisscross throughout the city. When complete, it will offer residents 11.5 miles of walking and bicycle trails that will connect to shops, restaurants, office parks, the Town Center and other locations throughout the city. The trail system is a long-range project that is expected to be complete in 2024.

# Reminder: New Waste Hauler to Provide Service in 2019

As previously announced, effective January 2019, the city will transition to a new solid waste and recycling collection provider, Waste Management. Waste Management (WM) will provide the City of Peachtree Corners automated cart services for household garbage and recycling collection.

## Highlights Include

### Brand New Carts:

- Each resident will receive 2 new carts (1 each, waste and recycling)
- Cart deliveries will begin mid December and run through the end of the month.

### Once-a-Week Waste & Recycling Collection:

- Green Cart/ Yellow Lid — single stream recycling. Acceptable items include: plastic bottles and containers, food and beverage cans, paper, flattened cardboard and paperboard. No sorting needed. Empty recyclable items directly into the cart - no plastic bags, Styrofoam or glass. There will be two designated sites for glass recycling drop off. More information on the drop off locations will be available prior to January 1, 2019.
- Green Cart/ Green Lid — waste. All trash must be bagged and placed inside your cart.
- To maximize efficiency and customer service, the city will be divided into five (5) collection zones. Collection will occur Monday- Friday. In December, residents will receive a postcard with their assigned collection day. Also available in December, route day information will be posted on both the city's and Waste Management's local Peachtree Corners websites.
- Carts are to be placed at the curb no later than 6 a.m. on collection day.

### Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Vehicles:

- Waste Management will be using brand new, quiet running, CNG trucks to service the city. CNG is the cleanest burning transportation fuel on the market today.

## Optional Services

**Bulk Item Collection:** Waste Management will collect 1 bulk item per collection day. Effective January 1, 2019, bulk items requests can be made through Waste Management's customer care team at (888) 964-9730. The cost per item is \$25.00.



### Yard Waste Collection:

Yard waste collection will continue to be a subscription program. The cost for this program is \$6.25 per month. Subscription options include January-June and July-December. Waste Management will collect up to 10 bags of yard waste clippings, as well as bundled limbs on the designated collection day. After December 1, 2018 residents can contact Waste Management to establish yard waste subscription service by calling (888) 964-9730. Subscriptions with Waste Management will begin January 2019.

There will be a slight monthly increase of \$3.38 which equates to a new cost of \$14.88 per month for standard service. The annual cost is \$178.56. Residents will continue to be billed annually on Gwinnett County's property tax bill. Residents age 65 and over will be eligible for a 15% discount, which is \$12.65 per month or \$151.78 per year.

# Burn Ban Lifted Effective October 1

The Georgia Environmental Protection Division (EPD) imposes a total ban on outdoor burning in Gwinnett County annually from May 1 to September 30.



Once the Burn Ban has been lifted on Oct. 1, please note you **MUST** first check with Gwinnett County Fire Marshall as to whether it is an allowable burn day. Many factors such as atmospheric conditions come into play that affect whether you can burn, and this can change daily.

A few conditions that factor into the decision as to whether it will be an allowable burning day are:

- prevailing winds that are predicted to be, or are, in excess of 15 miles per hour
- air pollution episodes
- the National Weather Service issuing a "Red Flag Warning" or a "Fire Weather Watch,"
- when there is fog, rain, or a cloud base that is diffused or ill-defined.

The burning of leaves, limbs, and natural vegetation on one's property shall not be less than fifty (50) feet from any structure and not less than twenty-five (25) feet from the property line.

No burning of solid waste or household garbage is allowed. Burning is **NOT** allowed on Sundays or nights.

*\*Remember: Do not bury the fire. The fire will continue to smolder. Tree roots could catch on fire which will eventually surface and start a wildfire. If it's too hot to touch, it's too hot to leave.*

And Echo Lakeside, a 267-unit complex under construction in Technology Park, is near completion. The complex is designed to attract millennials who work in Tech Park.

Work on the city's multi-use trail system continues; by the end of the year, you will be able to enjoy a leisurely stroll around a portion of Technology Park Lake. The 15-acre lake is located behind the office buildings fronting Technology Parkway and Technology Parkway South. Work is expected to begin this fall and the new section will tie in with the newly installed multi-use trail on Technology Parkway. Eventually the multi-use trail will link neighborhoods with the Town Center, office parks, retail shops and restaurants.

Green crosswalks have been added along Technology Parkway for pedestrian crossings and new pedestrian crossings have been added to Winters Chapel Road and East Jones Bridge Road.

### ***Our future:***


In April, the City Council took its first steps into the driverless age by adopting a resolution approving \$2 million for the Autonomous Vehicle Project which will include the installation of a 1.4-mile test track to be installed on Technology Parkway.

Technology Parkway was selected as the ideal setting for its relative ease in reconfiguring an existing roadway to allow both passenger cars and autonomous vehicles to safely co-exist with minimal disruption.

The goal of this initiative is not ridership, but economic development. The economic implications of investing in advanced vehicle technology are far reaching. Self-driving vehicles will eventually employ sensors, cameras, radar, high-performance GPS, light detection and ranging (LIDAR), and artificial intelligence, undoubtedly attracting new and existing AV companies to our city.

Prototype Prime, the city's startup incubator, continues to expand at an impressive rate. Now home to 14 startup companies, Prototype Prime will be the headquarters for a new autonomous vehicle accelerator, the Advanced Vehicle Accelerator, in conjunction with the new AV test track. And beginning in January 2019, the city's incubator will also offer a coding boot-camp through a partnership with Georgia Tech.

### ***Did you know ...***

- The Chattahoochee River supplies 70 percent of metro Atlanta's drinking water.
- In the Chattahoochee River Basin there are 205 rivers and streams not supporting their designated uses according to the Environmental Protection Division.

Two of these 205 impaired waters fall within the City of Peachtree Corners boundaries – as shown on the map.

### ***Here's the scoop....***

Polluted stormwater is the primary cause of water quality problems in the Chattahoochee River Basin. Every time it rains, water runs off the land as stormwater picking up pollutants and debris - including pet waste. Pet waste left on sidewalks, streets, yards or other open areas can be washed away and carried by rainwater into storm drains and drainage ditches which flow to nearby streams, rivers, and lakes.

As it decays, it uses up dissolved oxygen and releases compounds that are harmful to fish and other aquatic life. Pet waste also contains nutrients that can cause excessive algae growth in a pond or lake, upsetting the natural balance.

Most importantly, pet waste contains harmful bacteria such as E. Coli and fecal coliform, some of which can cause disease in humans and make water dangerous for swimming and other recreation.

### ***How can you help?***

You can help protect Atlanta's valuable water source and restore the two impaired waters inside Peachtree Corners to support their designated use by the following:

- Pick up pet waste in your yard or on a walk with a plastic bag or pooper scooper.
- Dispose of the pet waste using one of the following methods:
- Put pet waste in your regular garbage can or dumpster—ensure that it is in a securely tied or closed plastic bag.
- Bury pet waste at least one foot deep and cover with soil in your yard or garden. Avoid burying in food-growing areas.
- If your home is on a sanitary sewer, flush pet waste down the toilet, but don't flush plastic bags or cat litter. Septic systems are not designed to accommodate the high pollutant load in pet waste and can cause premature failure.

## City Adding More Sidewalks

The City Council recently approved a contract agreement for survey, design and engineering for sidewalks for the following:

- Triangle Parkway
- Northwoods Parkway
- Westech Drive
- Metric Place
- East Jones Bridge Road from Simpson Elementary to Jones Bridge Park



These are funded primarily from a 2018 Georgia Department of Transportation grant to the city through its Local Maintenance and Improvement Grant Program.

## Sidewalk Bank Established



The City Council recently modified an ordinance that had required the installation of sidewalks on all new development and re-development projects on existing or new, public or private streets.

At its July meeting the Council approved an amendment to the ordinance creating a Sidewalk Bank which allows developers to provide a financial contribution in lieu of installing sidewalks in locations that would not contribute to the city's sidewalk network nor serve as a pedestrian amenity.

The new ordinance allows developers the ability to contribute the equivalent monetary value of those sidewalk improvements into the City of Peachtree Corners Sidewalk Bank for locations such as industrial areas where pedestrian access is limited.

The funds in the Sidewalk Bank will be used to pay for sidewalks in established areas more suitable to pedestrians. It will also allow the city to continue its efforts in expanding pedestrian connectivity throughout the city.

## Home-Based Businesses Required to File for Occupational Tax Certificate

Did you know that if you are operating a business out of your home, you are required to submit an application with the city and adhere to the requirements for a home-based occupation?

## Startup Provides Useful Product to Farmers

A Peachtree Corners startup has created a product to help make changing weather patterns a little less burdensome on farmers.

Trellis, a budding business at Prototype Prime, provides an affordable option to farmers dealing with turbulent temperatures and irregular rainfall.

The company was started in 2015 by Liz Buchen and Adam Snow, both Georgia Tech graduates. They have degrees in aerospace engineering and both saw a void in the agriculture market for a tool to help prevent overwatering and provide farmers with timely information about their fields.

Watering a field typically costs a farmer about \$9 per acre for every inch of water applied, so watering 100 acres one time yields a \$900 water bill. Having farmers in her family, Buchen recognized the expense and learned that existing monitoring stations were pricey, at \$2,000-\$5,000 each.

Buchen and Snow set to work on finding a solution, using circuit boards, cellular technology, a 3-D printer, hardware and software.

"Our secret sauce is in the software," Buchen said.

What makes the product different, in addition to a lower unit price of \$450, is its ease of use. Farmers will get 'dry' alerts on their phones, either by text or email. Information is quickly available on a color-coded dashboard. Farmers who want to dig into the data a little more can do so in monthly reports.

Trellis now has 700 devices located throughout the United States. Sensor stations placed in the ground send data to a cellular base station in the field. The sensors collect moisture readings at two different depths, 5-to-24 inches down, depending on the crop. The sensors also measure temperature. Data is collected every two hours and stored in the cloud.

"Only 10 percent of growers use sensors to decide when and how much to irrigate," Buchen said. "We're trying to change that."

The Prototype Prime startup incubator, located at 147 Technology Parkway, assists early-stage hardware and software startups in launching.
